This is the time of year where we begin planning for the new year as our young women make initial indications for future study patterns.

There is great interest from both the girls and many of our parents.

Schools are staffed on one teacher per thirty students in junior school, and one teacher per twenty-four students in senior school.

As you are aware our classes are considerably smaller than this, but there are still number constraints, and, as in all schools, if a subject does not get enough indications of interest it unfortunately does not run. We endeavour though to ensure that we cater for the requests of as many of our students as possible providing one of the broadest choices of any school in the area. Hence the number of small classes across the school.

Each Year participates in a special assembly and girls are asked to discuss their choices with you at home.

Students maintain the same subjects from Year 7 to 10, with the addition of three and later two electives requiring little change to subject patterns.

However Year 10 have a special Parent Evening as they make their major choices for the coming HSC. It was wonderful to see so many Year 10 parents at our recent evening.

The Year 12 Trial HSC Exams are also upon us at this time and we wish the Year 12 every success in this important step towards their final HSC exams.



Year 9 History Canberra Trip

This year's annual Year 9 History overnight excursion to Canberra was of special significance in this centenary year of the Gallipoli Campaign. Each of our students who attended became a real part of history and were able to almost feel and experience for themselves the first day of the Gallipoli landing through a very realistic multimedia and high tech digital recreation of the campaign especially designed for this special centenary year by the Australian War Memorial which was perhaps the highlight of the excursion. Our students were visibly moved as they were guided through the trench dioramas in particular, and the wall of names of those hundreds of our diggers who made the ultimate sacrifice in the name of freedom.





Other highlights of our excursion were a visit to our national film and sound archive where our students were shown selections of some of the very earliest films produced in Australia such as *The Kelly Gang* – perhaps the first feature film in the world made in 1906.

There is hope for our political future as our ladies role-played a parliamentary debate in Parliament House – a real eye-opener in terms of the potential some of our students revealed in their higher order debating and logical thinking skills.

A guided tour of the Art Gallery of Australia gave us an in-depth view of some of the nation's most significant art treasures.

Lake Burley Griffin and its unique beauty came to life in a most enjoyable one hour cruise with a commentary on some of Canberra's lesser known historical aspects.

For most of our students, a night time opening of Questacon's high-tech scientific hands-on gadgets provided a highly entertaining and relaxing climax to a very full and busy first day.

Once again, all our students accredited themselves exceptionally well and were excellent ambassadors for our school.

A huge vote of thanks to Ms Parramore, Mr Phipps and Ms Tan who gave so generously of their time and effort to make this one of our most memorable Canberra excursions.


















School Holidays, but No Break for Year 12

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
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
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
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BEING BIOMECHANICAL
