But with highs comes the sadness of the farewells we make to those who leave us as they take that next step in their lives' journeys.


We farewell our Year 12 2015, wishing them the greatest success, as they prepare for their HSC Exams and their futures away from school.

## Year 8 History Medieval Day

One of the highlights of the school calendar each year is always *Medieval Day* which gives our enthusiastic Year 8 historians and their equally enthusiastic teachers the opportunity to be transported back in time to a world of kings, queens, knights and castles in a hands on, experiential, exciting and dynamic full day of learning which would be difficult to replicate in any text or film.

This year saw a magnificent array of medieval costumes including witches, Robin Hoods, squires, monks, peasants and lots more, all very creatively and imaginatively made by our students which filled our hall with bright rays of colour and a realistic atmosphere of a long bygone era.

It was quite something seeing actor James Adams using the audience to recreate the stocks and pillory punishment system, as well as various forms of medieval torture such as the infamous scold's bridle or an edge of the seat battle sequence featuring an array of medieval weaponry replicas such as crossbows and very sharp and lethal spears which provided our very receptive students with an exciting taste and atmosphere of life in the middle ages.


