MATHEMATICS NEWS

RGHS Excellence in STEM Award 2022 – Lyssa

For the first time this year we established an Excellence in STEM Award, inspired by the outstanding achievements by an exceptional Year 12 student, Lyssa, across a large number of STEM HSC subjects.

In particular, Lyssa has been highly successful in embedding broad and deep knowledge, problem solving and critical thinking skills expertise across Extension 1 Mathematics, Mathematics Advanced, Physics, Chemistry and Science Extension.

Her investigation tasks for both Mathematics Extension and Mathematics Advanced achieved the top grades and her Science Extension project was top of the course. Lyssa achieved first place in Physics, first place in Mathematics



Advanced, second place in Mathematics Extension 1, first place in Science Extension and second in Chemistry.

We are proud the UNSW has agreed to support our award for Excellence in STEM and very excited to present this first RGHS Excellence in STEM award to Lyssa Thomas.



Barbie Bungee 8MA1

Barbie has had many different experiences since she was first seen in 1959. She has had more than 150 careers on her resumé – from pilot to police officer, registered nurse to rock star, veterinarian to aerobics instructor. This week 8MA1 enabled Barbie to experience the thrills of a bungee jump!

In this project, 8MA1 worked in groups to create a bungee jump for a Barbie doll. Their objective was to give Barbie the greatest thrill while still ensuring that she is safe.

Using mathematical conjecture, collecting experimental evidence and graphing of the linear relationship between the length of the cord and the distance Barbie drops, 8MA1 found an algebraic rule that predicted the cord length required so she should come as close as possible to the ground without hitting the floor.

The conjecture was:

I believe that ______ is the maximum number of rubber bands that will allow Barbie to safely jump from a height of 479 cm.

The conjecture will be tested by Barbie attempting a bungee jump from the Level 3 flagpole down to the Quad.

Breaking News

Congratulations to Mr Ismail and his wife Jessie on the birth of their son on Monday 31 October

Now, continuing with faculty curriculum updates this report focuses upon our work in the Year 7 Geography course this year. An integral section of all stages of Geography 7-10 is the use of geographical tools/skills. These are used by geographers to assist in the acquisition, processing and communication of geographical information. Broadly these tools/skills are categorised under the headings:

- Maps in both digital and non-digital forms
- Fieldwork has been limited somewhat by Covid
- Graphs and statistics
- Spatial technologies interacting with real world locations
- Visual representations diagrams, images, cartoons, symbols, models etc



Various components of these broad categories of skills have been utilised in implementing the content areas for Stage 4 Geography this year. These content areas have been:

- Landscapes and Landforms
- Place and Liveability
- Water in the World
- Interconnections



Stage 4 Assessment items in Semester 2 have included a written report on a water based natural disaster incident and an examination integrating both content and geographic skills.

The Finance Academy was held on 28 & 29 September and was attended by Jesslyn (Economics) and Leila (Economics & Business Studies)


"In the Finance Academy, conducted each day from 8.30am till 5pm, the course consisted of activities & discussions with employees and external contributors. We learnt about global investment and the role of UBS. We were able to make new friends and gain an insight into career opportunities while mixing with employees and cadets during canape functions.

Particularly memorable was an interactive case study regarding a major recent acquisition involving Sydney Airport. This excellent project enabled us to work in teams and think constructively about the decision making processes necessary. We experienced first hand the nature of the advisory role of UBS and were guided by the board members involved in the final decisions. We were also able to meet Ross Gittins, the Economics editor of the Sydney Morning Herald. Ross writes weekly Economics opinion columns and he shared with us his career path and what is involved in his research and seeking of current information.

"I was very privileged to be one of the 45 Year 11 students across NSW to participate in The Young Women's Leadership Academy held by UBS. This was an invaluable experience for me. Civics and Citizenship Program



Congratulations to Ruby who was selected to participate in the Civics and Citizenship program! We are very proud of Ruby to be representing Randwick Girls' High School at such an important event.

"The Civics and Citizenship program was an amazing opportunity to learn more about the Australian democratic system and issues facing the future of our democracy. The day began with an introduction to NSW parliament house with a tour of both the Legislative Assembly and Legislative Council and explanation of the procedures in each house. We then joined the zoom with all the other states and were officially welcomed to the program by Dr Michele Bruniges, the Secretary of the Department of Education. This was followed by three engaging keynote speakers who spoke on the topic of the day of whether Australia should have compulsory voting. The first keynote speaker Emeritus Professor Judith Brett introduced us to the history of compulsory voting in Australia and the impact that things like the secret ballot have made on universal democratic processes. Professor Christine Wallace then presented some of the arguments for and against compulsory voting and Professor Mark Evans introduced us to voting procedures in other democracies. After hearing from the amazing speakers, we got into smaller groups to discuss our opinions on the topic. This was an amazing opportunity to get to know other students from schools across NSW and have smaller discussions about what the topic means to us. We then came back together and were given the opportunity to present our ideas to the whole group. After everyone had presented their ideas, we were asked to vote on the topic with an overwhelming majority voting in favour of keeping compulsory voting. Finally, the program closed with a communique being presented to the President of the Senate, the Hon Sue Lines. Overall, the program was an amazing opportunity and really interesting opportunity to discuss and debate a topic that has the potential to change the future of Australian politics."

Vaping in young people

E-cigarettes, or *vapes*, are not safe for young people. They come in many shapes and sizes and can be hard to spot as they can look like everyday items including highlighters, pens or USB memory sticks.

Key vaping facts

- Many vapes contain nicotine. Nicotine can cause long-lasting negative effects on young people's brain development, including impaired learning ability and altered mood, and can increase the risk of depression and anxiety.
- Vapes can contain the same harmful chemicals found in cleaning products, nail polish remover, weed killer and bug spray, which can lead to serious lung diseases.
- Young people who vape are three times as likely to take up smoking cigarettes.

The law around selling vapes

It is illegal to sell vapes to anyone under the age of 18 years. Young people often purchase vapes online, from retail stores, or from friends and contacts on social media. You can report suspected illegal sales of vapes to <u>NSW Health</u> or by calling the Tobacco Information Line on 1800 357 412.

Talk to your child about vaping

It's important to take the time to talk to your child about the risks of vaping. Try to start the conversation in a relaxed easy-going way, and remember your goal is to have a conversation, not deliver a lecture. Importantly, get the facts at: www.health.nsw.gov.au/vaping
