It has been great to observe the dedication of our students throughout the year. The results they have achieved in Semesters 1 and 2 are testament to their commitment and engagement with their learning. Students' final reports for Semester 2 are now available in the Sentral Parent Portal.

Congratulations to the Class of 2022, you have made it to the end of your high school career! We would like to congratulate you on your excellent HSC achievements. Our school has achieved a success rate of 10.24%, up from 9.66% in 2021, and above the state average of 5.47%. We especially want to acknowledge the high standard of teaching demonstrated by the HSC teachers, especially those from the History, Creative Arts, English and TAS faculties in helping our students achieve these results. Overall, every faculty in the school contributed to the 76 Band 6 results, and four Band 4 results in Extension subjects. In total 42 students were on the 2022 HSC Honour Roll.

Know your Allies. Don't worry. Keep going.

Thank you - I am honoured and amazed to be here.

Congratulations to all of you for getting to this point – to those of you who have won awards well done it's a great start – to those of you who have yet to win awards it's a long race your time will come.

Principal Andre has given me a brief

- Celebration of womanhood, the roles women play women reaching for the stars,
- How it has been for me in my industry
- How to face challenges, be optimistic, develop grit and resilience in ourselves and others to survive and succeed in the face of challenges.
- What employers are looking for

Where are we now - Women play every role at every level. Women do not yet occupy enough roles at the top level. Where we are is aspiring to have 50% of the top jobs. Where we need to be is not needing to have that conversation. Not needing to talk about women reaching for the stars. Automatic appointment of the best person to the role.

There is no magic formula. There are libraries full of books on this subject. The amount of content out there can feel pretty overwhelming. Today I would like to talk to you about some simple things we can all do to ensure progress towards that point by sharing some advice I was lucky enough to have been given when I was young.

Let me ask you a question — are we all fully present? We ask ourselves this at work at every meeting because if we want to achieve our goals we need to be focussed. This means we need to be paying attention, at work, in the classroom, in our relationships and not scrolling through our phone, chatting to the person next to us. People who succeed are focussed. They do things that require no talent which we can all do; work hard, turn up a few minutes early, prepare, listen carefully say thank you, manage their emotions, they say things like hmm I haven't thought of it like that I need to reconsider...... they think. So, are you fully present??? It's actually a tough discipline to maintain.

Three pieces of advice I was given when I was young. Know your allies. Don't worry. Keep going...

Allies - an ally is someone that aligns with and supports a cause with another individual or group of people

Know your allies

This is something my Dad often said to me and it is good to understand. In my life all sorts of people have been great allies.

I was raised by feminists - men who were feminists although they would have laughed at you if you had said that. My father and my grandfathers were men familiar with hardship and they knew that in these circumstances often things did not go well

for women. They believed women got a raw deal. They admired women for their tenacity and endurance. They knew that in their lives women held the families together. Made sure everyone was fed. They encouraged the women in my family to get educated – get your stripes it was called. My father and grandfathers believed there was no reason why women shouldn't do anything they wanted to. They treated us as equals. These were men who did not need to be advised to celebrate women. They pushed us hard. They gave good advice – know your allies, keep going, don't worry.

Know your allies – you may find them in surprising places – they may also be your toughest critics.

Worry – the state of being anxious or troubled about actual or potential problems,

Don't worry — "Don't worry our kid — what have you got to worry about?" my grandfather a man who spent his late teenage years in the trenches of World War 1, was gassed twice and worked as a labourer all his working life advised me that I hadn't got much to worry about. I think he meant keep things in perspective. And that is great advice especially now in this era of social media. Especially for women in this era of social media. Years later I read (I think in the 7 habits of highly effective people) that Highly effective people do not spend time worrying about what other people think about them. My grandfather was definitely a fan of that philosophy although he would have said "take no notice"

Keep going for most of us things won't go to plan. Talk to your elders - even those whose lives look as if they have been mapped out and executed with precision – it's generally not the story. It is critical that we realise this and that we have the ability to reset and rethink. That our expectation is that there will be adversity. My mother left school at 16, became a teacher and had 5 children. There was a woman who knew how to keep going. She later said she was simply too busy and focussed to worry about the criticisms made by others.

Armed with this advice how has it been for me – well here I am speaking with all of you - it has worked out well. Perhaps not quite as I expected.

Things have happened. There have been challenges. It hasn't always been fun or easy. The first time I realised things really might not be going to plan was when I graduated and the only way to get a job was to move to London, sleep on a friend's floor and get a job selling advertising space.

How did someone with an honours degree in Economics, Politics and Sociology end up doing this. It was an era of high unemployment. Always remember there are external factors you can't control and you may need to change your game plan. Rent needed to be paid. It was the best education I could have had. Learning how to cold call and sell. The way you did this was to scour other publications for adverts targeting the same target audience as your publication. Call up those businesses who were advertising and also the yellow pages were a great source of leads.

The model was something like 100 calls, speak to 10 people get 1 sale. The thing was you didn't need that many sales, you learned a lot about communication, rejection and how to make your case quickly. You learned how to ask the right questions and to listen carefully to the answers. After a while it became second nature. It was very useful to someone like me who is a natural introvert. It focussed the mind. I learned a lot from the person who taught me. It made me practise grit (before grit was a thing) and determination. I learned to learn from the rejections and build on the sales.

I found some great allies and got given a team to run very quickly.

It prepared me for much that lay ahead. Who would have thought?

Those first jobs you have, maybe in a small business, making endless coffees or serving fries in MacDonalds will expose you to many of the same things. Take the opportunity to watch your employer carefully. Be fully present.

Then for a while things went smoothly, I executed a career change into Insurance and was doing well. Very well corporately. Then my second child became ill. I decided to take a career break to take

care of the family. We were lucky over time he made a full recovery. I had a third baby. Time to go back to work and resume my career. There was just one problem — no one wanted to hire me. I was over qualified, out of touch, the world has changed Claire.... it was fortunate that I had been trained to understand that no was a buying signal. I called up the rejectors and found out exactly what the issues were. Turned out they were more scared of me than I was of them....

Know your allies – I remembered a man who had once tried to persuade me to join his business turned out he had had a stellar career in headhunting and was now in Singapore. I called him up and explained the problem. He gave me as a project to an up-and-coming young head hunter. I went to see him. He gave me a list of tasks, counselling me that this would be difficult. To his surprise I did what I was told. Including instructing everyone I knew to help me find a job. A real ally my sister-in-law called and said that whilst in a doctor's waiting room on Melbourne she had found me a job to apply for. Human Resources Manager, part time, excellent rates, cbd. Perfect except I'm not an HR Manager - "No Claire but you can do all of these things just tell them". So, I wrote to the hiring manager and said I can do each the things on the list gave examples and they gave me the job. That week I was offered 3 jobs.

The allies came up trumps, I kept going and I didn't worry about the negativity. I didn't like it. It was hard work. I was up late at night and early in the morning getting all of this organised.

When I look back, I realise that adversity presented opportunities. Resilience didn't come naturally; it helps to look at the facts and try and step out of the situation. Figure out what skills you have and how to use them. Think about how people you have known have overcome adversity. Ask them their stories. Don't worry about the failures, learn from them. Don't be afraid to reset.

What do employers want. First let me say that Insurance is a great Industry and you should definitely consider a career in insurance. Insurance offers an amazing variety of roles — are you creative? Insurance has marketing roles. Love numbers Insurance has huge finance teams. If

maths is your thing be an actuary. Like to consider taking risks there is the underwriting department. Interested in what can happen to people - claims. Do people interest you? HR. Have a natural urge to make sure things are done properly - Risk & compliance. Insurance is a massive industry and it is always needed.

Employers want; People who apply thoughtfully for roles — respond to the points in the advertisement — it works. People who are punctual, reliable, work hard, solve problems, who say when presented with new facts — I may need to rethink. You can all be that.

Conclusion

The Allies – the men who were feminists who didn't know they were feminists knew – you are stronger than you know.

What those men who were feminists who didn't know they were feminists would be pleased about is that whilst we haven't reached the ideal point yet, you are starting from a point in time where we can say – in no small part thanks to our modern male allies.

Science Report

The science faculty are very busy in Term 4 keeping students engaged and supporting them for the remainder of 2022.

Year 12 are nearing the end of the first term of the HSC with all three science classes having assessment tasks due this term. This term has been filled with activities aimed at developing students content knowledge and scientific skills. Physics has been working through module 5. The class has been conducting various experiments modelling projectile motion. Their first practical assessment task is in Week 8 where they will have to design and conduct an experiment in class. Biology has been working through the process of protein synthesis. Students have been working hard in making a 3D model of this complicated process. Year 12 Chemistry have been working on fermentation and enthalpy conducting various experiments. The students have also had the opportunity to make soaps, bread and other engaging activities.




Year 10 are finishing off the Ecosystems in Crisis topic. Students are studying the impacts of human activities on an ecosystem and what can be done to minimise these impacts. Students are also building terrariums to learn about the interactions between biotic and Abiotic factors.

Year 9 are working hard learning about natural disasters and their causes. Students are working collaboratively in groups in creating a presentation of a historic natural disaster of their choice. Students are also working on making a model to show how Earth's crust has changed over millions of years and how this has affected the locations of the continents.

Year 8 are completing the Our Earth in Space topic. They are busily working on scale models of the solar system, creating a travel brochure for visiting a planet in our milky way galaxy and learning about our universe.

Finally Year 7 are coming to the end of their first year in high school. They have all grown so much since the start of the year and have integrated themselves into the Randwick Girls High School community. They are finishing their Energy topic where they have been building rollercoasters, solar ovens and electrical circuits.

Careers News

Year 10 2022 Work Experience

The Year 10 cohort participated in a week of work experience from Monday the 28 November to Friday 2 December 2022. During their work experience week students gained a valuable insight into a variety of work environments such as NSW Parliament House, the Australian Broadcasting Commission (ABC), the Garvin Institute of Medical Research, Vogue Australia and the Sydney Jewish Museum. In addition students attended a variety of retail outlets, primary schools, libraries, design centres, music production companies, leading hotels, VET clinics, mechanic workshops, engineering companies and law firms. Some students also participated in a week of virtual work experience. Year 10 students share their work experience stories below:

The Shangri-La Hotel: Laura

During my week of work experience, I worked at the Shangri-La Hotel as a kitchen hand and assistant, and additionally was invited to work alongside the hotel's food safety manager. In the pastry kitchen, my job as a kitchen hand included preparing ingredients for the chefs. My tasks were to prepare various fruits and pastries for high tea, in mass quantities for all of the hotel quests. One afternoon I spent time filling trays of mini glass jars with freshly whipped cream and strawberry jam preserve for the next day's high tea. Further, I would deseed cartons of passion fruits and finger limes, alongside cutting and filling the bases of strawberry tarts. Afterwards, I worked in the restaurant kitchen as a kitchen assistant, where I would assist the waitresses before service. This included polishing cutlery and glasses, folding napkins into intricate designs, and setting guest tables. Whilst I spent time with the food safety manager, we would go around and check through all of the hotel's kitchens to ensure that each food safety procedure was met, and that each kitchen was up to code. I thoroughly enjoyed my time spent at the Shangri-La, and was enlightened and able to learn a lot of information and techniques from the hotel's chefs and food safety manager. From this experience, the information taught will assist me in becoming a food scientist in my future, and has affirmed my love for it.



The Garvin Institute of Medical Research: Raya

During the week of Year 10 work experience, I had the amazing opportunity to go to the Garvan Institute of Medical Research. During my time there I was able to participate in various activities including lab work, mice testing, data collection and a literature review. The highlight of the week was definitely being able to get an insight into the current experiment that the researchers were working on, which consisted of researching how different genotypes deal with glucose and insulin in different ways, and how the brain can manipulate a person's perspective of food and in turn their metabolism and risk of obesity. Being able to go to work experience, made me realise that science and research are definitely things that I want to continue in my future.

Local Member for Coogee Dr Marjorie O'Neill: Ruby

I had the wonderful opportunity of working with the State Member for Coogee, Dr Marjorie O'Neill , as part of the Year 10 work experience program. During the week I attended local events and helped with electoral administration duties throughout the week. I attended events with the Waverly Council Senior Citizens and got to look around the Fit n Able Gym in Bondi Junction, which is working towards creating a gym for people with disabilities in the lead up to the International Day for People with Disabilities. At the office, I helped by creating social media content, editing videos of Marjorie talking in Parliament, analyzing data from surveys that the Coogee Electorate Office was coordinating and helping stamp flyers for door knocking. It was a really valuable experience which has inspired me to further consider a career in politics in the future.



Vogue Australia: Francesca

Last week I had the amazing opportunity of doing a week of work experience at Vogue Australia. I got to do many tasks such as take care of the clothing for shoots, organise the models' clothing, sit in on editing meetings and help out in the wardrobe department. A highlight of my week was being able to unbox the new clothing for an upcoming shoot for one of the models and meeting people in the fashion industry. My week of work experience has definitely confirmed that I want to pursue a career in the fashion industry!

Bondi Veterinary Hospital

I was lucky enough to find a placement at Bondi Junction Vet Hospital. This incredible opportunity allowed me to see what Veterinary nursing is really like, rather than the glamorised procedures shown on the media, as well as gain valuable knowledge and skills. Completing Year 10 work experience has helped me immensely, guiding me on the pathway to Veterinary Nursing. Next year I will be doing the Certificate II in Animal Studies at TAFE NSW, as an EVET, whist qualifying for my HSC. This will then allow me to move onto Certificate IIII in VET Nursing post high school.

NSW Parliament House: Ceyda

I worked for NSW Parliament in the education, engagement & communications, and media team department. I was a part of a constitution convention and I assisted to hand out ballot papers. I learned some different research skills and how the Australian Constitution works. I was asked to do a research task and also to do a virtual tour questionnaire for the students. I had many highlights from work

experience. Investing in our schools

The NSW Government is investing \$8.6 billion in school infrastructure over the next four years, continuing its program to deliver 160 new and upgraded schools to support communities across NSW. This builds on the more than \$9.1 billion invested in projects delivered since 2017, a program of \$17.7 billion in public education infrastructure.

The NSW Department of Education is committed to delivering new and upgraded schools for communities across NSW. The delivery of these important projects is essential to the future learning needs of our students and supports growth in the local economy.

Project overview

We're upgrading Randwick Boys High School and Randwick Girls High School to provide modern facilities and improve educational outcomes for the school community. The delivery of these projects is essential to the future learning needs of our students.

The upgrade to Randwick Boys High School will deliver upgraded science labs, a Fitness Learning Hub and new Technology and Applied Sciences (TAS) facilities.

The upgrade to Randwick Girls High School will deliver refurbished TAS facilities, a new woodwork learning workshop, enhanced library facilities and an administration reconfiguration that involves relocating the school entry.

In addition to the upgrades, other improvements will be made to both campuses including toilet facilities, roof replacements, power supply, enhancements to the halls and upgrades to movement areas including covered walkways.

Progress summary

Randwick Boys High School

The procurement process for a contractor to deliver the new Fitness Learning Hub is in progress. It is anticipated that a construction contract will be awarded before the end of Term 4 2022 to allow works to occur over the upcoming summer school holidays. At this stage, completion is scheduled for Term 1 2023.

Meanwhile, the procurement process for a contractor to deliver the science laboratory upgrades has been brought forward. It is now anticipated that a construction contract will be awarded in January 2023. The delivery of the upgrades will occur during Term 1. The works will be staged to minimise disruption to school operations as much as possible.

Planning for the electricity upgrade is ongoing. Negotiations with Level 3 electrical contractors and the energy authority are in progress.

Randwick Girls High School

The construction contract for the new woodwork learning workshop has recently been awarded. Works are expected to start over the next few weeks with most of the construction taking place during the school holidays. We expect the new workshop will be ready for students to use for the start of Term 1 2023.

Planning for the Food Technology facilities upgrades is underway. It is anticipated that a construction contract will be awarded during Term 1 2023. The delivery of the upgrades will occur during Terms 1 and 2. The works will be staged to minimise disruption to school operations as much as possible.

Next steps

Randwick Boys High School

- Start electrical upgrade works during Terms 1 and 2 2023.
- Start planning for the delivery of the Food Technology upgrade.

Randwick Girls High School

- Upgrades to the library are planned for Terms 3 and 4 2023.
- The Administration facility upgrade is scheduled for the December 2023/January 2024 school holiday period.

Maintenance work

Additional maintenance works will be taking place at both schools over the next few months. These works are part of each school's annual maintenance provision and will be delivered in addition to the upgrade program. The type of works covered by the maintenance program typically include but are not restricted to roof replacements, asphalt repairs, painting and carpet and vinyl floor replacement. The local Asset Management team will be co-ordinating both programs of work to ensure that there are no scheduling issues.



December 2022 for Randwick Schools

The Newmarket Randwick Stage 2 project has made good progress over the past few weeks with the transport of soil offsite continuing into December. The installation of inground services have progressed on some areas of the project, which will continue into 2023. Throughout January and February a piling rig will be brought into the site to complete the foundation support for the building. We anticipate that construction traffic conditions from the project will remain at similar levels to those experienced in 2022. Moving into 2023 the project team will start to prepare for the crane being erected on site. This will take place at some stage in the first few months of the year with more information to follow in the New Year.

We will also be running a *Name the Crane* competition with pupils in early 2023 so keep an eye out for that.

Please note, the construction site will be closed for the holidays from Friday 23 December until Wednesday 4 January 2023. Site activities will continue to operate between 7am and 5pm during the week and on Saturdays outside of these holiday dates.
