Step Out Speak Out 2022

November 25 marks the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women.



The Step Out Speak Out Walk, organised by NSW Police Eastern Beaches Local Area Command and Randwick City Council, marks this significant day on a local level, raising awareness about domestic violence and asking everyone to stand up and say no to domestic violence.

So, on this very day, 25 November Randwick Girls' High School's SRC participated in this march, in solidarity alongside victims of domestic violence.

It was a great honour for our Year 10 and Year 12 SRC members to walk alongside the Governor of NSW, Her Excellency the Honourable Margaret Beazly; the Mayor of Randwick, Dylan Parker; Karen Cook, the Chief of Eastern Beaches Police Force; the Honourable Dr Marjorie O'Neill MP the Member for Coogee; the Honourable Matt Thistlewaite MP, the Member for Kingsford Smith; the Honourable Michael Daly MP, the Member for Maroubra and various members of our local police force.

Both Amy and I were privileged to participate as keynote speakers and MCs at this event alongside students from Randwick Boys' High School, Marcellin Catholic College, St Spyridon College and Champagnat Catholic College. This was made possible after a series of in-person and online speech workshops which gave us the skills we needed to be able to proudly speak to our wider community on the importance of recognising the dangers of domestic violence within our community, for it is not a private problem but rather a public issue that should be recognised as such.

It was truly moving to be present for all the vital addresses but more importantly to hear student voice being recognised on such a significant day.
