ast week saw our school hold the second Parent-Teacher Interviews for the year, these being our first face to face meetings in a long time. It was wonderful to see the amazing turnout of parents and students, and to be able to welcome them back onsite to school after such an extended period of offsite, ZOOM based events. For parents and guardians of students in Years 7 and 10, Parent-Teacher Interviews will be held on 28 June 2022 from 4pm – 7pm. We look forward to seeing you there.

It was also wonderful to be able to host our annual Year 10 Subject Selection night onsite this week. A range of speakers from many faculties presented an overview of the subjects on offer for Year 11 in 2023, providing information and advice around this process. This event marks the start of the subject selection process and transition to senior school for our Year 10's, and I urge them to consider the information provided at this event, as well as consult widely with their teachers, the Careers Advisor, Year Advisor, as well as with their RANDWICK GIRLS' HIGH SCHOOL

allocated Head Teacher Mentor during the upcoming interview process.

Next week we will be holding a Year 7 and 8 Police Cyber Safety presentation, to be held in the hall on 21 Tuesday June. Police Liaison, Officer McManus, will be taking our students through important information on ensuring safety in the online world, as well as providing practical tips and strategies to avoid potential pitfalls and dangers.

With this busy time in the assessment schedules of our students, it is timely to discuss the issue of academic progress and the N Award warning system. NESA rules state that when a student appears to be at risk of receiving an N Determination (ie non-completion of course requirements) the principal must advise the student, parent and guardians in writing of the tasks or actions to be undertaken in time for the problem to be corrected. This system is known as the N Award warning letter process, and provides students the opportunity to remedy and take corrective action as required. In the event that you receive such notification, it is imperative to ensure that you do not ignore these letters, as doing so may jeopardise your progress in that course. If you require information on available support services, or clarification on what is required, please speak to your teacher at the first instance You can also speak to your Year Advisor, Head Teacher of the faculty concerned, or myself for further advice and support. It is important that you act as soon as possible, and ensure that you are engaging in dialogue with your teacher at the earliest possible opportunity. If you would like any further information about this process, please speak to me directly.

Chinese Excursion

On 7 June, our school's Year 9, 10 and 11 Chinese students had been given a wonderful opportunity to go on a fun yet insightful excursion to the Art Gallery of New South Wales and to eat yum cha at The Eight. During the visit to the museum, the students were given a chance to tour around *The Ways We Eat* and explore the long history of Chinese utensils, ranging from beautiful porcelain bowls dating back to many dynasties, to graceful eating sets with matching spoons, forks, chopsticks, plates and bowls. Students were able to learn and see for themselves cultural pieces gifted and bought from China. After the educational period in the museum, the students enjoyed another form of Chinese culture, a favourite of many - food! Students tasted delicious forms of Chinese food, mainly in the form of yum cha, trying different types, such as steamed charisu buns, hargow, spring rolls, fried rice and egg tarts. Students were also tested on their Chinese greeting skills as the teachers challenged them to thank the employees in Chinese. In-school Languages HSC Study Workshop



In Week 6, Mr Cheng and Ms Sun conducted Beginner and Continuers Languages Workshops for our Year 12 Chinese, Japanese, Spanish and French students. In the workshops, a range of strategies was discussed including how to unpack exam items in different sections, three steps to answe oral questions, a practical approach to manage exam time and how to plan writing responses to meet context, purpose and audience. Students who participated in their own language HSC study day also shared strategies they had learned from the day and how they found it helpful when implementing these strategies.

Year 9 Chinese class activities on Weather. Students started to learn character writing this term and how to describe weather and seasons in Australia and China.





BIOTech Futures Program

BIOTech Futures is an innovation and mentorship program that aims to empower the brightest young minds. With Yongjie being the Team Leader, the team has chosen three projects they would like to work on with their mentor: 3D bioprinted placenta for developing new generation treatments for high-risk pregnant women, tumour on a chip and low-cost water filtration system for human consumption.

We look forward to their final project at the end of July.

Debating report

Randwick Girls' has enjoyed a strong start to the 2022 debating season. Under the careful tutelage of coach Scott Clayton, the students have been preparing meticulously in each training session and learning a host of valuable debating skills. In Week 5, the Year 9 & 10 team faced Matraville Sports High School in the first round of the Premier's Debating Challenge. Both teams had strong arguments, with many moments of brilliance throughout the debate. Ultimately, the adjudicator decided to award the win to Randwick and was also kind enough to provide individual feedback for each student involved.

Week 7 saw the first round of the Premier's Debating Challenge for the Year 7 & 8 team. All the team worked together and produced very compelling arguments against their opponents, Matraville High School. The intense hour of preparation time paid off for Randwick with the adjudicator declaring Randwick the winner of this very close debate.

Special thanks to coach Scott Clayton who has continued to inspire and educate the students on the finer points of debating. The Year 9 & 10 team is scheduled to face Sydney Boys in the next round of the Premier's Debating Challenge. And the Year 7 & 8 team will face Rose Bay Secondary College in their next round.

History Faculty Report

Reconciliation Week

Friday 27 marks the beginning of Reconciliation Week but is also the anniversary of the successful 1967 Referendum, which included First Nations Peoples as part of the census and allowed the Federal Government to make laws in relation to the wellbeing of First Nations Peoples. The end of Reconciliation Week is Friday 3 June, the anniversary of the Mabo High Court Decision, which overturned the fallacy of terra nullius and recognised the land rights of the Meriam people, traditional owners of the Murray Islands (which include the islands of Mer, Dauer and Waier) in the Torres Strait.

Reconciliation Week is about every Australian coming together and building relationships, trust and respect between the broader Australian community and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. It is a time to learn about First Nations cultures, histories and achievements, both past and present. Reconciliation is the process of building respectful relationships, by reflecting on Australia's past and acknowledging Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples history and continuous connection to Country.

To achieve reconciliation, significant developments need to be made. Acknowledgement, respect, and continuous learning that is free from bias, racism and misinformed stereotypes. It is necessary for *every* Australian to listen to First Nations voices, not only this week, but every week and that we continue to reflect on our actions and educate ourselves and others.

This year's Reconciliation Week theme is *Be Brave. Make Change*. It centres around building confidence and being brave to stand up and take action against discrimination and towards reconciliation. We believe it is extremely important for every Australian to be brave and make change, and help Australia in its journey towards reconciliation. During Reconciliation Week, we were encouraged to learn about and celebrate the rich diversity of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures and histories.

Our First Nations students and Year 11 Aboriginal Studies class collaborated to deliver an exceptional Reconciliation Assembly, which included; individual acknowledgements of connection to Country by the First Nations students, some heartfelt personal stories from our Year 12 students, an inspirational speech from Ms Hall on the importance of embracing First Nations culture, history and perspectives and an outstanding dance by the Junior First Nations Girls Dance Group, choreographed by our very own Sadie from Year 8.













Chalk Boards

As part of learning about the significance of Reconciliation Week the 10T History class worked in teams to design and create themed chalk boards in the canteen, as a visual representation of the week. They worked collaboratively with Year 12 Aboriginal Studies student Abi Tinker, who focussed her Major Project on the importance of language, to integrate some local Dharawal language into their chalk works.





Kinchela Boys home visit

On Friday 13 May 2022, Randwick Girls High School students from Years 8 through to 12, had the privilege of meeting two survivors from the Kinchela Boys Home (KBH). Uncle James Michael Widdy Welsh and Uncle Robert *Bobby* Young shared with us their experiences as children of the Stolen Generations. They spoke of their time at the infamously horrific Kinchela Boys Home near Kempsey, a government-run *home* which operated between 1924 until 1970. Before the presentation, the *Uncles* met in the library with the First Nations students, Aboriginal Studies students, and teachers, for a personal introduction and lunch. In the period 5 assembly with Years 10, 11 and 12, the *Uncles* shared their experiences of being forcibly removed from their loving families and the impact this had on their connection to their families, culture and their wellbeing.

They also spoke of the longer term effects, in terms of the intergenerational trauma they and their families suffer, as a result of systemic abuse. Uncle Bobby and Uncle Widdy showed students an animation outlining experiences of boys who lived at the Kinchela Boys Home, that was created by a survivor of the KBH, showing the story of brutality that the children experienced. The talk was raw, jarring and confronting for many students and teachers. The Uncle's emphasised the importance of truth-telling and carrying these stories forward, to educate future generations and move towards healing as a nation. 


Raffle

We would like to announce that the raffle raised a total of \$880 and the winner was Ms Jennifer Jordan.

This brings us to a whopping total of \$1818.30 raised. This money will go towards the Kinchela Boys Home Aboriginal Corporation to continue to deliver programs and services to KBH survivors, their families and community members to receive culturally safe, trauma informed, strength base services.



On 27 May, Randwick Girls High Schools First Nations students, Aboriginal Studies students and Year 10, 11, and 12 Dance Students attended the annual Koojay Corroboree on Coogee Beach to launch Reconciliation Week. The ceremony recognised and educated the Randwick community of the importance of Aboriginal culture, history, language and dance to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples and reinforced what it meant to reconcile and *Be Brave Make Change*. The students who attended were fortunate to watch, celebrate and interact with the Bidjigal and Gadigal Dreaming through dance, music and storytelling that were performed and learnt stories on gathering, fishing, hunting, plants and animals. In addition to the dances performed, Colleen Tighe Johnson, a proud Gomeroi Fashion Designer, displayed her Honey and Ant collection. Where she wished to share and revive the spirits of her Ancestors and Gomeroi Dreaming through her designs.

Overall, the Koojay Corroboree excursion was an amazing educational experience, that enlightened our knowledge on First Nations Peoples tradition, culture, and history and what it means to acknowledge and reconcile the land of the Bidjical and Gadigal people that we live upon today.
