You may start to notice a little more activity around Newmarket as construction works have now officially commenced on Stage 2 of the precinct. 


Girls inspired to innovate is a program designed to encourage innovation for students in Stage 4 at Randwick Girls HS

Context of our program

Girls' Inspired to Innovate

Year 8 GITI: Randwick Girls' High School Indigenous Garden

The aim of this project is for students to develop an appreciation and understanding of how to plan, design and sustain a native garden and how this contributes to visibly celebrating, sustaining and connecting to country. Development of Augmented reality skills in communicating information.








Numeracy Integration- Site Analysis "Landscape Designer"

Some numeracy skills that have been integrated into the program include:

- Measuring entire garden using Trundle wheel and Ipad App "Measure"
- Measuring a component of the garden (see diagram) using Trundle wheel and "Measure App"
- Collect data from these activities
- Create a Scale drawing of entire garden.
- Scientific experiment of designated area capturing light, temperature, wind speed, and humidity.
- Documenting data across four periods of time in a table
- Creating seperate graphs in Canva for each data point (i.e Light, temperature, wind speed and humidity)
- Organisation of data in a poster to effectively communicate ideas
- Researching plants to understanding light, height, humidity, temperature requirements
- Creating a coloured scaled drawing from a birds eye perspective
- Budgeting and costing the designated space



Year 8 GITI work SAMPLES

Indigenous Garden - Site Analysis Poster

Aim: To investigate the Indigenous Garden, to collect data of the humidity, temperature, light and wind speed to identify where plants should be placed to grow more sustainable.

Method

- 1. Using a thermometer, it will demonstrate the measurements of the temperature of the area whether it's hot or cold. Temperature helps with the plants process, as photosynthesis, transpiration, and respiration enhanced, the temperature will cause the plant's to change from a leafy vegetative state to a flowering reproductive growth.
- 2. Filling the back piece with water then reattaching to the humidity thermometer, the two thermometers, one for how wet and other how dry, will scale the how dry and wet to result in the percentage of the humidity. The purpose of this is because plants cannot evaporate water which is part of the process and have nutrients from the soil.
- 3. By turning on the light meter to 200 (increase if not working) and standing still, the light meter will indicate how much light is being shown in the area since all plants require lights for photosynthesis and make energy with light, oxygen and water into carbohydrates.
- Holding an anemometer above will record the wind's speed to collect as supply for carbon dioxide and for the plant's stem to grow more durable.
- Repeat all the steps to get data (once a day for 3-4 days) of each component to observe there's a change.

Results

Scale Drawing

After investigating the Indigenous Garden, we discover that Area U doesn't have a large amount of wind. The data of the wind's speed had barely any wind, providing answers that are below 3.0. We've thought that we would have a big amount of wind because my group's area was on the highest step, thinking we have more advantage of the wind.

We also discovered that the humidity has lots of moisture near 80% using the bubblers' water, which is the exact amount of moisture we need to grow plants to help with photosynthesis, minerals and nutrients for the soil.

Discussion

After collecting data for sunlight, I believe we should still continue collecting data on sunlight. The reason why we should require more data is because of a big unexpected change when we looked into our recordings. On the first two days, the sunlight showed a high amount of light, however, on day 3 it made a huge drop and started to decrease on day 4. I want to keep collecting more sunlight data, so that my group can have a better understanding of what's the average measurement for when we soon start planting.






Evaulate

An Indigenous plant that would be suitable and would thrive in my area (section u) would be Hakea Laurina. This plant is needed to provide an established amount of water for the stem to be more durable. To fertilize the seeds, hakeas are to be shown at full light to support the process. Hakea seeds are to be at 15°-23° to germinate a 15·100 days.

Hakeas plants would definitely be a suitable place in my area as t perfectly match to my analysis, since they are suitable in full light massive amounts of water and needs semi good temperature.


Year 7 GITI: Podcasting the past assessment

Careers News

Term 2 has certainly been a busy term in Careers at Randwick Girls' High School with senior students participating in a wide variety of career development opportunities and School to Work programs such as the 2022 HSC and Careers Expo, the Girls in Property program, a Girls In Trades workshop with Supporting and Linking Tradeswomen (SALT), a Yamaha Motorbike workshop, Youth Engagement Strategy (YES) program TAFE courses, Year 12 Tertiary Seminars and a University Admissions' Centre (UAC) subject selection presentation. An overview of the Girls in Property program is included below.

Girls In Property Program





The Girls in Property program is a joint initiative between the Property Council of Australia and the NSW Department of Education. The program aims to raise awareness of the wide range of Careers in the property industry. The Girls in Property program enabled twenty Year 10 students, who submitted a successful expression to interest to participate in the program, gain an insight into career pathways in the property industry and engage in project based learning with industry professionals. Students were placed into either a Retail, Residential, School Space or Warehouse team. Each team was presented with a design brief and was allowed two weeks to realise the needs and challenges of their brief. Following on from this, students presented their projects to a judging panel, comprising of industry professionals and Design and Technology teacher Ms Alexandra Hall. Students were provided with valuable feedback from the judging panel, who were able to share their ideas and expertise on project development.

As part of the program Ms Evers and Ms Poniris, accompanied the students to several events such as an excursion to the University of Western Sydney and a city site tour, where students heard from the Lord Mayor, Clover Moore, and other leading female industry professionals. All of the students involved produced outstanding group projects, gained a valuable insight into the property industry and developed their employability skills through collaborative team work.

The Retail team, comprising of Bronte, Chelsea, Amy, Isabella and Siniva were selected to represent Randwick Girls' at the Awards Night. The Awards night took place on Wednesday the 29 June 2022, at Barangaroo in the city. The event was a fantastic opportunity for students to showcase their work and present their outstanding project to leading industry professionals, members of the Property Council, fellow students, parents/guardians,

and members of the Randwick Girls' High School teaching staff and senior executive. Ms Andre, Ms Reilly, Ms Evers and Ms Poniris, who were part of the audience, were extremely proud of the Randwick Girls' High School finalist team for the dedication the students demonstrated in preparing and presenting at the Awards Night. As a part of the Girls in Property Program, we were given the opportunity to go to Barangaroo and listen to the Lord Mayor of Sydney, Clover Moore. We then walked over to 25 Martin Place and heard from a panel of women working on the redevelopment of the MLC Centre. We then had the opportunity to walk around 25 Martin Place and see all the architectural and structural aspects of the building in action.
